Dental hygienists focus on preventive dental care. They remove deposits from teeth, apply fluoride, take x-rays, examine patients' teeth and gums, and check for mouth diseases.

- Clean calcareous deposits, accretions, and stains from teeth and beneath margins of gums, using dental instruments.
- Record and review patient medical histories.
- Examine gums, using probes, to locate periodontal recessed gums and signs of gum disease.
- Feel and visually examine gums for sores and signs of disease.
